Wendy and Sara work at the Jolly Java Kiosk housed at the main office. As their Vocational Counselor, I thought of Sara and Wendy when I received an invite from a colleague on Facebook looking for "actor's" to participate in a mock airport disaster exercise at the Capital Regional International Airport this past summer. The airport public safety staff worked with local medical response teams such as the fire departments, law enforcement agencies and hospitals to test their emergency responses.

This exercise was required by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA). Tri-county area mutual aid emergency personnel were expected to respond in the exercise as if the events were a real disaster. Wendy, Sara and I spent 2 hours in "make-up" where Wendy's eardrums were burst, Sara had burns on her face and hands and I had a piece of glass debris in my neck. We also had acting coaches and I had to ride in the ambulance to the mock hospital. This was a unique and fun experience and it was meaningful to Sara, Wendy and the community.

NOT JUST HORSIN' AROUND

What can a horse teach us about ourselves? It might surprise you that Animal Assisted Therapy (AAT), specifically Equine Assisted Mental Health is a growing field with positive results in many arenas. The Equine Assisted Growth and Learning Association (www.eagala.org) formed in 1999 with its vision being "dedicated to improving mental health of individuals, families and groups around the world by setting the standard of excellence in Equine Assisted Psychotherapy". Inquiries sometimes sound like "how does the horse fit on a couch?" Equine Assisted Psychotherapy (EAP) uses "horses experientially for emotional growth and learning". The collaborative efforts of a licensed therapist, a horse professional and the consumer, help to address treatment goals.

This experiential modality of mental health treatment promotes certain skills like "non-verbal communication, assertiveness, creative thinking, and problem solving, leadership, work, taking responsibility, teamwork and relationships, confidence, and attitude". EAP addresses a variety of mental health and human development needs, including "behavioral issues,

attention deficit disorder, substance abuse, eating disorders, abuse issues, depression, anxiety, relationship problems and communication needs".

There is something for everyone, a variety of wares at fair prices and they are always changing. They were the second business in Old Town to allow one of CMH's consumers an employment opportunity.

Sir Pizza sits along the flowing river in Old Town, where tires were once produced. It is a neighborly cafe with old world charm. It has a brick and mortar wall, comfy sofas, and an open beam ceiling. It is a great place to have meetings, study, hang out with friends, etc. Sir Pizza hired one of the twins mentioned earlier to work the same shift to commensurate with her twin sister.
