# **Previous Meeting Minutes:**

### **BUSINESS ITEMS:**

New Revenue Contract: Clinton County RESA

Gwenda Summers presented this item to the committee. She noted in some school districts, clinicians are being hired directly. Clinton RESA would like to partner with CEI for some physician positions in the future. Currently, CCRESA will hire one position to coordinate for linkage and support from CEI within the Clinton County school district. Gwenda said the intention is to continue through next year, as well. She anticipates the federal funding continuing through that point.

Paul Palmer asked about Eaton and Ingham RESA. Gwenda said she has been sitting on a committee with those two counties, and it sounds like both will be employing mental health therapists directly.

#### **ACTION:**

MOVED by Joe Brehler and SUPPORTED by Paul Palmer that the Program and Planning Committee of the CMHA-CEI Board of Directors authorize CMHA-CEI to enter into a new contract with Clinton County RESA to provide a Mental Health Therapist to provide mental health therapy services for the period of March 1, 2020 to September 30, 2020 and receive \$55,567.00 for those services.

# New Revenue Contract: Blue Care Network of Michigan

Sara said this is a project that has been in the works for some time. She said BCN approached her about four years ago, but at that time, BCN's model of reimbursement would have made CEI use general fund for services. BCN has since refined the model, and CEI is in a better situation to sign on. BCN developed a level system and are using a case rate within different levels. BCN would pay this weekly case rate to CEI for our services. Sara doesn't anticipate a large number of folks will participate at first, but feels this would be a good project to try out. She went on to say hopefully this will eventually be introduced to Blue Cross Blue Shield.

# Old Business:

# a. HCBS Update

Sara reminded committee members that at the last P&P meeting, it was discussed that the group would not only focus on the closing of the Transitions sites, but also other aspects of change at CEI relating to becoming HCBS compliant. She went on to say that there was a review of the behavioral treatment plans (BTP) by Michigan Fidelity Assistance Support Team (MIFAST) on January 17, 2020.

Joyce then shared the results from that review with the committee. There were two staff who were sent for the review from MIFAST. The overall strengths from the review included: CEI has clear policies and procedures on BTC, staff that are involved in the BTC are trained, and charts of consumers with a behavior treatment plan are reviewed as needed and 100% of BTP are current.

The recommendations from the review noted that CEI should develop a plan for staff outside of the committee so they are more aware of the BTC/BTP process, and that more staff should be sent to the State training. Furthermore, BTP review should be included in supervision meetings. The last recommendation was to develop a plan to capture, track and analyze more data around BTP.

Joyce went on to say the review was very useful as CEI is recognizing that any limitation for a consumer in a home should be put into a behavioral treatment plan. Karla and Joyce provided a few examples to the committee of small changes being made to treatment plans for limitations faced by consumers.

Joyce then shared that the State conducted a survey of CEI sites regarding HCBS compliance. The State came up with two levels of concern; 1) Out of Compliance and 2) Heightened Scrutiny. Joyce said HCBS compliance has been added to the list of criteria for site visitors from CEI. She said CEI has developed a great working relationship with MSHN in regards to having the help to move CEI towards compliance.

#### **New Business:**

Sara wanted to discuss the information session held by CEI last week regarding the proposed behavioral health redesign. She said last week, the Consumer Advisory Council opened a session for questions on the redesign. About 25 people attended the session. Then the CAC and attendees watched the MDHHS virtual forum together. There were 750 registrations for the virtual forum.

Discussion ensued among committee members about attitudes toward the redesign as well as the reasoning behind the redesign. Joe said he asked Alan Bolter "What problem are we supposedly solving (with the redesign)?" He has not received an

answer. Sara said we need to be able to preserve the public system but also need to be willing to change.
