Helping People Find Their Voices: Using a Range of Tools and Strategies

Regardless of your role in serving people, your ability to communicate with people who have communication challenges can dramatically impact the quality of their lives. This workshop will provide information about working with people with a range of communication abilities, including those who are not able to speak and others who have difficulty making themselves understood.

We will explore the relationship between communication, control and the behavior, wellness, and happiness of individuals. Our focus will be upon individuals experiencing one or more of the following diagnoses: stroke/aphasia, head trauma/brain injury, dementia, autism spectrum disorders, sensory/motor issues and related challenges.

You will learn basics for general assessment and intervention to support listening, following directions, expressing status, wants and needs and reducing frustration and behavior challenges. A range of simple, low-cost and creative communication tools and strategies for those with developmental and acquired communication problems will be provided with case examples for use.

Who Should Attend?

This workshop is designed for CMH clinicians and other professionals working with adults with severe mental illness, traumatic brain injury, or dementia. The presentation will also be useful for those who provide education and support to direct care workers or family

members caring for persons with challenging behaviors. Continuing education credits are available for nurses and social workers.

Lynn Sweeney has served as a certified speech-language pathologist and/or communication consultant for more than 20 years in hospital, skilled nursing, public education, community mental health, institutional, private home and private practice settings. She has served on the faculty at Central Michigan University as both a clinical director and/or graduate faculty member in the departments of Communication Disorders, Psychology and Special Education since the early 1980's and currently teaches functional neuroanatomy and psychology of women.

Lynn is the owner of Sweeney Communication & Consultation Services, a rehabilitation specialist with MidMichigan Health Care, and a consultant and public speaker nationally and internationally. In addition to her clinical work she has received a number of research and development grants in the area of communication disorders including two Governor's Research Excellence Awards from the State of Michigan for her work in interventions for brain injury. She has multiple scholarly publications and is currently completing the second manual in a series for assessing and working with children and adults with complex communication needs.
